

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President's Report



Greg Van Schaack (USCTA President)

Dear Fellow Members:

Greetings to the U.S. court tennis community. As I conclude my third year as your President, I do so on a sad note with the passing last year of our good friend, H. Dickson S. Boenning. Dick was the first President of the U.S. Court Tennis Preservation Foundation, and genuine friend of our game. To all who knew

him, Dick was the consummate gentleman-sportsman; easy to work with and always displaying a positive, upbeat attitude. These characteristics will be remembered annually by the continued awarding of the Boenning Sportsmanship Award for which Dick's family has reiterated their ongoing support and for which we thank them very much. Dick is truly missed by his many friends, admirers, and the court tennis family at large.

As for this year's court tennis season, I would have to say the theme is Chicago, Chicago, and Chicago. At long last the rumors, false starts, and wishful thinking have become a reality with the approval by the Board of Governors of the Racquet Club of Chicago (RCOC) for the restoration of the circa 1920's court that has been out of play since 1936. Finally, with the impetus supplied by then President Ally Bulley III and his "advisors" including Bill Bickford, Rob Wood, Rick Durkees, and Patrick Wood-Prince, the light has overpowered the dark and the court is in full restoration mode. From a site visit last June, I can say firsthand what a beautiful court we are going to receive into our court tennis community. With a gorgeous penthouse, walls to match the originals, and a Royal Dedans that will be fantastic, Chicago will become one of the premiere racquet facilities in the world. And to punctuate the enthusiasm with which this court will be received, a group of RCOC real tennis enthusiasts traveled to New York from Chicago to play their "club championship" even before their court was ready. At the time of my visit, the pro shop had sold over 100 racquets to the anxious members, while the club had hired Steve Virgona as its new head professional. In the June meeting of the USCTA Board, we inducted the Racquet Club of Chicago into the USCTA with all the rights and privileges that accompany the membership. There is now no doubt that the RCOC will be a contributing, healthy member of our organization.

Speaking of new courts, the efforts in Charleston continue



in a very positive direction. The Court Tennis Charleston (CTC) organization informs us that they have a hand shake deal with the Daniel Island Club, a beautiful golf, lawn tennis, and swimming country club, for the donation of land and the operation of the court when built. The plans call for a traditional court with viewing areas in the wall high above the dedans penthouse, along the main wall and high side wall, as well as traditional dedans and royal dedans which will make it the best gallery court perhaps in the world. In addition, the court will house the International Real Tennis Hall of Fame in a beautiful building that is being designed as of this writing. The court will introduce the process of "tilt up" construction which will create a very cost efficient and authentic surface on the walls. It is the hope of the organizers that this process will serve as a template for the easy construction of additional courts in the future. CTC has begun fund raising and is seeking support from the U.S. and international communities to accomplish its goals. All contributions will be accepted by the USCTPF and therefore be tax advantaged. You may contact me or Bill Blalock for further information.

Finally on the big picture stuff, 2011-12 will be remembered as the year your Association and the Preservation Foundation held extensive conversations to advance communications in an attempt to iron out areas of friction and overlap that were seemingly holding us back from advancing our mutual missions of expanding the game, being more inclusive, and raising more money. What emerged from those conversations

was a better committee structure that will include members of both organizations, the appointment of a "liaison" from each organization (Peter Pell for the Association and PJ Yeatman for the Foundation) and a better general understanding of each other's mission and how we can complement one another's efforts as we go forward. Many thanks to those eight folks who worked hard towards attaining our mutual goals.

Now on to the perhaps more mundane, but nonetheless important recap of the year's events and accomplishments beginning with the USCTA Annual Dinner and Auction held over the Whitney Cup weekend in New York. Once again the committee of Charlie Johnstone, Brian Owens and Arnold Spangler did a fantastic job of organizing the dinner, collecting auction items and executing a flawless game plan. In addition to providing a wonderful event where your Association inducted Penny Lumley and Rob Whitehouse into the International Court Tennis Hall of Fame, we successfully raised a significant amount of money that helps fund the many activities of your Association including prize money for professionals, junior development and court development. This year's Whitney Cup was won by the host team, New York, in a hard fought final over New England. Tournaments throughout the year went off flawlessly as well. The U.S. Open was played in New York in January with number two seed Bryn Sayers defeating number one seed Steve Virgona in the singles, while Virgona and the "old guy" from Tuxedo, Tim Chisholm, took the doubles title. Virgona had a fantastic year winning the IRTPA and the National Open singles and then going on to win the Eliminator (defeating Bryn Sayers) for the right to challenge for the World Championship against Rob Fahey. Your President was present for the World Championship where Steve played brilliantly but was unable to overcome the amazing railroad serve and sheer determination of the champion. Sets were 6-5, 3-6, 6-1, 6-3, 6-4, 6-3, 3-6, 5-6, 6-2, 6-3 over three days. The host, Queens Club, did a marvelous job and Susie Falkner and the IRTPA are to be praised as well for an outstanding tournament. It is my hope that the U.S. will be in a position to bid on the next world championship and that we can again successfully hold the event at one of our courts.

The Ladies U.S. Open was hosted in Newport and was won by the lovely and talented Claire Vigrass. Claire chose an up and coming young U.S. player, Amanda Avedissian, as her partner in the doubles and they prevailed. Congratulations to Claire and Amanda. Amada also won the U.S. Mixed Doubles with Pat Winthrop. Suzie Schwartz won the Anne Boleyn Handicap.

Pat Winthrop, our young Newport star, defeated Jeremy Wintersteen in the U.S. Amateur to capture his first (of perhaps many) U.S. Amateur titles. Jonathan Larken won his first Tuxedo Gold Racquet and Andy Roberts of Boston won the Etchebaster Cup.

On the old boy's circuit, Philadelphia hosted the U.S. 40s and 50s singles and doubles championships in March. Congratulations to Rich Moroscak on winning the 40 singles and doubles with Bill Barker, to Steve Hufford for the 50s, Norris Jordan and Ted Manges for the 50 doubles. Tuxedo hosted the US 60s & 70s where I won the 60s singles and doubles with Peter Clement and Mike Flinn won the 70s singles.

On the professional circuit, Philadelphia won its second consecutive National League title defeating New York. Philly's team was comprised of Steve Virgona, Rob Whitehouse and Gabe Kinzler. The National Open was won by Steve Virgona (over Mike Gooding). Finally, Camden Riviere won his third consecutive U.S. Professional for the Schochet Cup (he likes the Newport court!!) defeating Bryn Sayers.

Finally, it should be noted that your Association is in its most healthy financial condition since I joined the Board in the 1980's. Thanks to Arnold Spangler for his stewardship of our finances. Also Lex Miron, who has stepped down as Secretary, was and will continue to be a critical cog in the wheel of the operations of the USCTA. Many, many thanks also to Jane Lippincott who stepped off the Board, but will continue in her invaluable role as editor of the newsletter and annual report. Thank you Jane for all your hard work and dedication to the game and the Association.

H. Dickson S. Boenning

November 18, 1919 - October 28, 2011



There are few who can legitimately take more credit for the building of Prince's Court than Dick Boenning. Before he created the United States Court Tennis Preservation Foundation, the only available option was to find a school or other non-profit organization that was willing to let you build on their property. That is never an easy sell. The Foundation, which Dick brought to life, made it possible to expand the search widely. Had that not been the case, the court in Washington might never have come into being. Dick was a stalwart supporter from the birth of the idea to the opening in October 1997. Along the way, we learned that it would be advantageous to reorganize the Foundation under a different section of the tax law. "Full speed ahead" said Dick. He stayed with us after the opening as well, often calling to ask whether we had recruited any new players, how things were going or, most frequently, if there was anything he could do to help. Reliably, at the end of each year, a check would arrive signaling his continuing support of our efforts. To be sure, there were others who had their oars in the water but, without Dick, we would have been paddling our boats in the sand.

Haven N.B. Pell

There is much one could say about Dick Boenning. From his self-effacing yet extremely effective leadership style to his wonderful courtly manner and kind disposition, he was without peer. Among the most telling things about Dick is simply what he managed to bring out in others by mere example. Whether it was creating a new tie for the Racquet Club of Philadelphia (Percival 1987), or starting the Foundation, he had a way of inspiring others to rise to their highest potential merely by the example set by his own actions.

When a tax exempt organization needed to be created to hold monies raised through the Clothier/Martin Fund, then held at the International Tennis Hall of Fame, it was Dick Boenning who got it done. Working initially with the USCTA, Dick took the ball and ran with it, creating the US Court Tennis Preservation Foundation. Dick engaged his own counsel at his expense to create a charter and bylaws and apply to the IRS for tax exempt status. He built a board including the living greats of the game and nearly from scratch created the organization we know today. As one could imagine, it was all done without an iota of ego or selfinterest on Dick's part. Although, and those of you who knew Dick well will appreciate this, we did have the most magnificent custom stationery with the raised Foundation logo of the Paumier in brilliant burgundy. As has been noted about Dick, things were always done well and with grace.

Many a young Racquet Club member, or Foundation Board member for that matter, would find an answer to an issue or question, simple or challenging, by asking themselves "What would Dick Boenning do?" For those of us who knew him and had the pleasure of his friendship and collaboration, as I did for the last 25+ years of his life, there will be no better example of what one should strive for in life...great accomplishment, a wonderful family, the respect of your friends and peers, and a legacy of setting a shining example for so many and for so long.

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

History of the USCTA

The first reference to tennis in the Americas extant in the historical record is a decree against playing tennis on Sundays, issued by the Governor of New Amsterdam, Peter Stuyvesant, on October 26, 1656. The centuries that followed were replete with further proof that some version of the "game of kings" was being played in North America. In October 1876, exactly a year and a half after the newly invented game of lawn tennis came to these shores, Hollis Hunnewell and Nathaniel Thayer opened the first bona fide court tennis facility on Buckingham Street in Boston. Over the course of the next 120 years, 18 more courts were built; today there are ten active courts in the US, the oldest in Newport (1880) and the youngest in Chicago (2012).

The United States Court Tennis Association, under the leadership of its first president William L. Van Alen, initially convened on January 30, 1955 in New York. Prior to that time there was no central authority to regulate, promote, and preserve the game in the United States. Indeed, when the Laws of Tennis in America were first adopted on New Year's Day 1934, just three clubs – The Racquet & Tennis Club, The Racquet Club of Philadelphia, and The Tennis & Racquet Club – were signatories.

ADMINISTRATION

Besides the promulgation of tennis rules, which were revised in 1979 and again in 2000, the Association has the authority to coordinate and control all championships and major competitions, and in conjunction with its member clubs, organize and conduct tournaments for all levels of play in America. The USCTA sets the annual tournament schedule and supplies the national level competition medals. The governing body raises funds through membership dues and contributions and by hosting such events as the U.S. Court Tennis Association Annual Dinner and Auction. The USCTA financially backs the construction, maintenance, and restoration of courts, and subsidizes the development of female and junior players. The Association conducts relations with other national governing bodies around the world, promotes international play, and supports the U.S. at international competitions.

PROFESSIONAL TENNIS

One of its most essential functions is the vigorous support of professionals in America, without whom the continued existence of the game would be precarious. The Association provides prize money for tournaments such as the National Open, the World Championship, the U.S. Professional Singles for the Schochet Cup and the Men's and Ladies' U.S. Opens.



AMATEUR TENNIS

The Association also encourages top flight amateur play. It began publishing a list of the Top 25 U.S. Amateur Players in 2004 in order to stimulate competition and increase the level of play, particularly among mid to upper level players. The USCTA also promotes team competition by supplying teams and backing for such international challenge tournaments as the Bathurst Cup.

JUNIOR TENNIS

The USCTA is committed to ensuring the future of the sport in America through an active Junior Tennis program. It offers workshops and professional instruction as well as creates opportunities for young players to compete by funding international teams and supports U.S. tournaments like the Junior Nationals and the Lieb Cup.

PUBLICATIONS

The USCTA publishes an *Annual Report*, a monthly newsletter "Chase the First," a fixtures calendar, Top 25 rankings, e-mail news, and other announcements. The USCTA, in conjunction with the USCTPF, also maintains a website.

USCTA Tournament Play Guidelines

All players must be USCTA members in order to play in USCTA-sanctioned events. All players are expected to abide by the rules established by the host club with respect to dress, court behavior, club rules, entry fees and billing procedures, and the scheduling of matches. Most tournaments are essentially invitational, and players are expected to regard themselves as guests of the host club. For more Tournament Guidelines visit www.uscta.org.

USCTA RULES OF PLAY FOR NATIONAL TOURNAMENTS

- Semi-final and final matches are to be best two-out-of-three, six-game sets, with games played to deuce and advantage.
- Finals are to be held on Sunday, or if circumstances allow and at the hosting club's election, on Monday evening.
- No more than two rounds per day are to be played (including semis and final matches).
- Earlier rounds may be played to 40-all (best two-out-of-three, six-game sets).
- Preliminary rounds may consist of one ten-game set with deuce and advantage.
- Notice of format to be used must be given as soon as practical after the draw has closed and no later than the posting of the draw. If possible, suggested formats will be sent out with the tournament announcement.

U.S. AMATEUR

The format will be best two-out-of-three, six-game sets played to deuce and advantage up to the finals. The final will be best three-out-of-five, six-game sets. NB: This applies to both singles and doubles.

U.S. OPEN

The format will be best three-out-of-five, six-game sets played to deuce and advantage.

SPECIFIC TOURNAMENT RESTRICTIONS

The Jay Gould: A novice doubles tournament.

The Jimmy Knott: A mid to upper level amateur singles tournament where previous winners must sit out the following year.

The U.S. Parent/Child: Restricted to amateurs only.

The U.S. Junior Nationals: Restricted to players 21 years of age or younger. May be broken into divisions depending on entries.

The Lord Percival Cup: Doubles teams whose individual members have a handicap of 25 or above.

The Etchebaster Cup:

- a. The tournament is a men's amateur singles competition for U.S. residents.
- b. A player must be a member in good standing of the USCTA.
- c. Players must have a registered RTO handicap.
- d. Previous winners and finalists are ineligible.
- e. Any player with less than one year of experience may play.
- f. Any player with more than one year but less than two years of experience and a handicap of 25 and over may play.
- g. Any player with a handicap of 30 or more, regardless of experience, may play.
- h. The tournament will be played beginning in 1990 and every even-numbered year thereafter, at the Racquet & Tennis Club. In odd-numbered years the tournament will be hosted by other clubs on a rotating basis as determined through petitioning to the USCTA.
- i. The Etchebaster Trophy will permanently reside at the Racquet & Tennis Club. Each year the winner and finalist will receive a take-home trophy chosen and given by the host club.

USCTA Bylaws

ARTICLE I - NAME:

The name of the corporation shall be The United States Court Tennis Association, Inc.

ARTICLE II - TERM OF EXISTENCE:

The corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE III - PURPOSE:

The corporation is formed to act as a central coordinating authority between the various clubs which have courts, the individual owners of courts, and all amateur and professional players of the game, and in all other matters connected with the game, so as to foster and promote the game of court tennis and its history.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP:

Any person, club, corporation, or unincorporated association may be elected to membership upon the approval of the membership committee and the Board of Governors. The Board of Governors shall have full power to designate as many different classes of membership, with their respective prerogatives, together with the dues therefore, as the said Board of Governors sees fit.

ARTICLE V - BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

The directors of this corporation shall be known as the Board of Governors. The Board of Governors shall not exceed 20 persons, who shall serve for the period of one year until their successors are qualified, appointed, or elected in their place and stead:

- a. One representative from the Aiken Club.
- b. One representative from the Tennis & Racquet Club of Boston.
- c. One representative from the Greentree Court.
- d. Two representatives from the Racquet & Tennis Club of New York.
- e. One representative from the Racquet Club of Philadelphia.
- f. One representative from the Tuxedo Club.
- g. One representative from the National Tennis Club of Newport.
- h. One representative from the Georgian Court Club.
- i. One representative from the International Tennis Club of Washington, D.C.
- j. Ten representatives to be elected by the membership at the annual meeting, one of whom shall represent



the professional ranks. In case of a vacancy, death, resignation, or inability to serve of any of ten representatives, the Board of Governors shall appoint a succeeding representative for the unexpired term.

There shall be one alternate member of the board from each court. Such alternate member shall attend all meetings of the board and take part in all discussions thereat but shall vote only in the event that the principal member of the board from this court shall be not present.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS:

- a. The officers of the corporation shall be:
 - 1. President
 - 2. First Vice-President
 - 3. Second Vice-President
 - 4. Secretary
 - 5. Treasurer
- b. Each Officer must at the same time of his election be a member of the Board of Governors and shall be elected by the Board of Governors at their annual meeting to serve for one year, irrespective of his continuing as member of the Board of Governors for such period.
- c. The President shall be the chief executive officer of the corporation, and shall preside at all meetings of the corporation. He shall appoint the chairmen of all committees, and shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.
- d. The first vice-president shall, during the absence or temporary disability of the president, possess all powers of the president.
- e. The second vice-president shall, during the absence or temporary disability of the president and the first vice president, posses all powers of the president.
 - f. The secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings

of all meetings of the corporation, and a list of all persons selected to membership. In addition, he shall conduct the correspondence of the corporation, and shall notify the officers and the Board of Governors, and all members of the committees of their election and appointment.

g. The treasurer shall be custodian of all funds of the corporation, and shall deposit the same in the name of the corporation in a bank or trust company to be designated by the Board of Governors. He shall collect and receive all monies due to the corporation. He shall keep full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements in books belonging to the corporation, which shall be open to the inspection of any member or officer on reasonable notice. He shall make a report of the finances of the corporation at all meetings. His accounts shall be audited by a certified public accountant annually.


ARTICLE VII - COMMITTEES:

The president may from time to time appoint chairmen of committees, and describe their powers and duties.

ARTICLE VIII - ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

The Annual Meeting of the Board of Governors shall take place immediately following the annual meeting of the members. At least two weeks' notice in writing shall be sent to each member of the Board of Governors. Six members of the Board of Governors shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.

ARTICLE IX - ANNUAL MEETING OF MEMBERS:

The annual meeting of the members of the Corporation shall take place no later than June 25 of each year, at such time and place as the Board of Governors shall designate. At least two weeks' notice in writing shall be sent to all members. Nine members shall constitute a quorum at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE X - SPECIAL MEETINGS:

Special meetings of the members and of the Board of Governors may be called by the president or at the written request of five members submitted to the secretary, upon seven days' notice to either the members or the Board of Governors. Such notice shall state the purpose for which the meeting was called.

ARTICLE XI - AMENDMENT TO BYLAWS:

These Bylaws may be altered, amended, or repealed by a vote of the majority of the members or of the Board of Governors at any annual meeting or at any special meeting thereof, which is called for the purpose, in the notice of which the subject matter of the proposed alteration, amendment, or repeal of the articles to be affected thereby, shall be specified.

ARTICLE XII - INTERPRETATION OF THE BYLAWS:

Any question as to interpretation or application of these bylaws and the conduct of the affairs of the Association shall be decided under the laws of the State of New York.

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
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Treasurer's Report 2011-2012



Arnold Spangler (USCTA Treasurer)

For our fiscal year ending September 30, 2012, we expect to be in good financial condition. Our total cash reserves, which are projected to be in the range of \$150,000, should allow us to grow in the future, cover our operating expenses, and weather any significant cyclical downturn. Our overall financial philosophy is to be conservative while at the same time ensuring that we meet all of our organizational goals and commitments. We also want to

provide a financial cushion in the event we experience any revenue decreases due to lower auction income, a reduced membership base. Or an unforeseen large expenditure.

Regarding the year about to end, our revenue from membership dues and auction income is projected to exceed \$100,000. The annual auction which was held during the Whitney Cup tournament in New York generated in excess of \$40,000 and has become an important source of our annual income. In the next fiscal year, opening of the Chicago court will add significantly to our membership base and help grow our revenues.

Our future expenses will continue to grow as we grow. In 2012, we made a major financial commitment to our communications group to improve and upgrade our newsletter. In addition to a new design, changes included extended coverage of tournaments, schedules, pictures, and announcements, as well as articles relating to the game. We also maintained our commitment to publish a high quality annual report, which is partially subsidized by ad sales. We also continued our support of the professional game by contributing to the U.S. Open, National Open, U.S. Pro Singles-Schochet Cup and the National League. Other operating expenses include such items as insurance, sub-contract work, meetings and other miscellaneous items.

We plan to continue our conservative fiscal policies to keep our finances healthy.

We would again like to thank the USCTA members for their continued support of the Association as we go into the 2012-13 fiscal year.

We will make available the financials for the 2011-12 fiscal year as soon as our accountants sign off on them this fall.

Notes to Financial Statements 2010-2011

THE UNITED STATES COURT TENNIS ASSOCIATION, INC. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS SEPTEMBER 30, 2010 AND 2009

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

NATURE OF ORGANIZATION: The United States Court Tennis Association, Inc. (USCTA) is a non-profit corporation organized on February 25, 1955 for the purpose of fostering and promoting the game of court tennis for persons of all ages. USCTA's activities include establishing and administering the rules governing the game of court tennis, supporting clinics and special events, and selling merchandise for promotional activities.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING: The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the cash basis of accounting. Consequently, certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when cash is disbursed rather than when the obligation is incurred.

DEPRECIATION: Property and equipment are being amortized using accelerated methods over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets.

INCOME TAXES: The Association is an organization which is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501 (c) (4) of the Internal Revenue Code.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT PRESENTATION: For the financial statements, USCTA has adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standard (SFAS) No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organization." Under SFAS No. 117, USCTA is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted assets.

CONTRIBUTIONS: USCTA has also adopted SFAS No. 116, "Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made." Accordingly, any contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions.

New courts are the most visible symbols of success and we are pleased to have had important roles in two of them: Prince's Court in Washington and Georgian Court in New Jersey. In Chicago, tax law requirements proved inconsistent with the desires of the Club, so the Foundation had no role other than cheering from the sidelines. In Boston, the Foundation is working closely with multiple parties to be of assistance if possible. In Charleston, we await developments.

Our communications objective was met when we transferred responsibility for real tennis online to the USCTA, which also took responsibility for uscourttennis.org, the website for the game in this country. An active Facebook group has been created as well.

Finances are the fuel for the engine and our Investment Committee carefully manages these.

Our general philosophy reminds us to:

- 1. Encourage ideas from whatever source
- 2. Encourage volunteers to take on projects that interest them
- 3. Do not undervalue volunteer time
- 4. Give responsibility to small nimble groups
- 5. Avoid bureaucracy
- 6. Learn from mistakes and be willing to make them

2011 Inductees: Penny Lumley & Robert Whitehouse

Two people were inducted into the International Court Tennis Hall of Fame. Penny Fellows Lumley, MBE became the second woman to enter the Hall (Betsey Whitney was the first in 1995) and one of the greatest female players in the history of tennis. She won the ladies' world championship singles six times and doubles seven times. (Two years before winning her first world title she lost 6-0, 6-0 in the quarters of the world championships.) As the dominant woman in the 1990s, she got her handicap down to a 10.3, the lowest ever for a woman at the time. Penny won the British ladies' singles twelve times and the doubles ten times; in the U.S. she won six ladies' singles, six doubles (with Evelyn David, Fiona Deuchar and Jo Iddles) and one U.S. mixed (with Kip Curren).

The twenty-sixth inductee into the Hall was also its youngest, forty-two year-old Robert Whitehouse. The head pro at the Racquet Club of Philadelphia, Rob grew up in the East Falls, PA neighborhood. His Uncle is Ed Noll, who brought Rob into the club as an assistant on the fourth floor in 1983 when he was a freshman at Roman Catholic High. He worked for four years there, thus becoming the last of a very long and distinguished line of pros who were mentored (and growled at) by Jimmy Dunn. In 1990 during his junior year at West Chester University, Rob was asked by Noll if he wanted to come back to RCOP as an assistant pro.

During his quarter century of service in Philadelphia, Rob has coached eight Whitney Cup winning sides and taught many hundreds of people the game of tennis. As a player he has won the Jimmy Dunn doubles six times, been a finalist once at the Pell Cup, and has captained the Philadelphia team to victory in the National League. Having played in seventeen U.S. Opens, he once reached the finals of the Open doubles. His best handicap was a 1.7. In squash doubles, Rob has also been a top player, reaching the finals of prestigious invitationals like the Gold Racquets, the William White and the Silver Racquets.



Tommy Turns Seventy

It is the morning of Halloween and you are a small, nervous fourteen year-old going into a big club in the city. A few weeks before, the stationmaster at the train station near your house asks you if you want a part-time job at a men's club downtown. You had worked in past years

as a caddy and at a butcher shop—this sounded like going to the moon.

You get off the elevator on the fourth floor. You immediately see guys playing some strange, medieval-looking game. You take a left and walk down a long corridor. In front of you, sitting as a desk in the pro shop, is the legendary old pro. He tells you the facts of the game, the club, what this unfamiliar world is all about. He says that the guy you are replacing, the assistant, he's just gone up to Boston to work full-time. This could be a career for you. You have no idea what he is talking about.

Yes, sir, you say, again and again, scared to say anything else. The pro interrupts: "None of this 'yes, sir, no sir' business with me. Call me Jimmy. Call the members 'Sir.'" You chirp: "Yes, sir."

That was October 1956. It was the beginning: a \$1 an hour salary on a six-hour-a-week apprenticeship at the Racquet Club of Philadelphia. And so the fourteen year-old Thomas Matthew Greevy, Jr, a freshman at Roman Catholic High School, resident on Wiehle Street in East Falls, began his career in court tennis. Today he is the longest serving professional in the world. This fall he enters his fifty-seventh consecutive season in the game.

This 2011-12 tennis season has had many highlights, but one passed without notice. Tommy Greevy turned seventy. He has

been famously secretive about his birthdate—"I've been lying about it for years," he said—and almost no one in the game knew that he had passed this milestone. To celebrate our special, suddenly septuagenarian friend, we've gathered some stories from a dozen of his friends and colleagues.

Tommy Greevy worked at the Racquet Club of Philadelphia from 1956 to 1968. He took six months off to serve in the Army but otherwise was a survivor in the Jimm Dunn apprentice program. Thirty-one Dunn apprentices stayed in the game of tennis. "He'd lose your name—'get me coffee and toast, kid," said Greevy. "In the sixties he brought in an apprentice named Tommy Vendetta, another Roman kid from East Falls and Dunn had everyone call him Tony at the club because he didn't want to have two guys called Tommy working for him. He was always testing you. One year he sent me to manage the Philadelphia team for the Whitney Cup. This was a real thrill—until we got to Greentree, and I realized he had snookered me. It was the worst team we had fielded in years, a lot of the top guys couldn't make it and we lost every set that weekend. 'What kind of effing coach are you?' he yelled at me when we got back."

When Greevy came to Tuxedo in April 1968, he was just the seventh head pro since the club opened in 1899; Joe O'Donnell had worked there from 1962-67 before stepping down due to illness. Tommy, while working at the Homestead in West Virginia, met a Tuxedo member who discovered that Greevy knew how to string racquets by hand and hired him to teach lawn tennis for just the summer. "I was supposed to be here for six months but I lost my car keys and am still here," he said.

When he came inside for the winter, he found a very small court tennis program. Women, more or less, didn't feel welcomed in the Tennis House; juniors were nonexistent and there were just a dozen or so regular players. It was so somnolent that for four winters he commuted into New York and worked at the Racquet & Tennis Club during the week. Thus Greevy is the last active pro in America to have worked under the two great legends of twentieth-century tennis: Jimmy Dunn and Pierre Etchebaster.

Greevy was an outstanding player. He won the pro-am singles and doubles draws numerous times. In 1973 he won the inaugural U.S. Professionals, held at Tuxedo. He was down 2-1 in the finals against Ed Noll and came back to win in five. (He lost to Noll the following year in the finals, as well as the two following finals in 1975 and 1976.) He got to the finals of the U.S. Open in doubles a number of times. One year he & Dev Hamlin had a match point but lost.

Besides concealing his birthday, Greevy also lied about Claude Rains. For years, Rains' name appeared on Tuxedo tournament draws. A mysterious player without a home club or a handicap, Rains always seemed to lose in the first round. Only recently did Greevy reveal the truth, that Rains was just a filler name when someone dropped out of a draw mid-tournament, and Greevy had to shuffle players around. Rains had played the lead in the 1933 classic *The Invisible Man*—classic Greevy.

He met his wife Marge on a blind date. They lived for a while in the Tennis House before moving to her hometown of Cornwall, New York. Marge died in a car accident during the 1992 Gold Racquets weekend, and Greevy became a single parent for their three children. Today Matt, Kara and Damian all live in Cornwall and Greevy is rightly proud of them. Matt and Damian are school teachers and Kara teaches exercise classes and does makeup for weddings. "It's been a lot of chase-offs," Greevy said. "Life's like that.

Greevy had a tough winter this year. He suffers from celiac disease, which sometimes has caused intense skin rashes and itches. In January he spent over a week in the hospital with spinal meningitis. He had horrible nightmares as his body battled the infection. "I'm still vertical," said Greevy, who is about to return to the club to continue teaching part-time. "The hardest thing has been getting back physically. I am impatient. I'm an Irishman from East Falls: patience is not my big suit.

"I just miss being there. I put in so much time at Tuxedo, it was second nature. One of the thrills I have is when the kids I taught, they come up to introduce me to their wife, their kids. I've taught four generations of some families. They grow so fast, it is a fast world sometimes." Yes, sir.

Another Guy From East Falls

I started at the Racquet Club of Philadelphia in 1964, when I was a freshman in high school. Tommy had hired the senior who had hired me, so I was two rotations behind him in the Dunn apprentice system.

My early impressions of Tommy was that he was sort of a character. He was a joker. He'd call from the club's kitchen, pretending



to be a member, asking for a court. He'd go off laughing.

I learned my phone skills—how to arrange games for members—because of Tommy: he always had me call girls in his black book to arrange dates for him. I also learned record-keeping from Tommy. In those days Jimmy Dunn kept all the records for the Philly inter-club league squash matches. They were these postcards with the results on them from all the clubs. He gave them to Tommy to compile. Tommy drove a Chevy Corvair. I remember driving home with him to East Falls and below the passenger seat were hundreds of league cards, scattered on the floor.

Tommy started taking me to court tennis events. My first one was the U.S. Pro Singles. I was a kid from East Falls. I had never gone over the Franklin Bridge. And Tommy was the guy who encouraged me, who brought me along.

Tommy is Tommy. I was welcomed with open arms to take over the programs of which he was the caretaker for over forty-two years. That had to be a tough thing to do. You can never imagine that transition going as smoothly as it has. It couldn't have gone better, except for his health and him being around more. He is a wonderful ambassador for court tennis and for the club and has been a huge supporter of me and my family.

People Person

I started at the Racquet Club in Philadelphia in 1972. I was fifteen, at Roman Catholic High. My first tournament in New York, Tommy was working at the R&T and he was very helpful. He was always helpful, giving advice. He'd notice something on court: "You've got a ball like this, give a thought to hitting this shot." He had his radio ball, snake ball, all these names for "shot."

Tommy wasn't a hard hitter. He was finesse. Almost all the guys under Dunn were finesse guys, except maybe Eddie Noll. Tommy had a great cut volley off the return of serve. He'd get it down and make it worse than a yard. He had severe bite on his railroad. He'd play off-speed shots into the tambour. Dunny used to teach that: vary the pace, spin it down there with a purpose, don't just slug it.

I didn't miss a Gold Racquets for twenty-five years. I enjoyed it immensely. Tommy knew how to match up the players for the doubles, fitting the right personalities together. Once the Gold Racquets weekend began, everyone wanted to talk to Tommy. He'd walk out of the marker's box and everyone wanted a piece of him. In prime time on Saturday afternoon, he'd get swallowed up, all these guys wanting to talk with him, catch up, wanting to hear some stories. He was very good at that. The first time Greevy missed a Gold Racquets was the year Marge died. I ran it with a couple of other pros. It was awful.

Eddie and Tommy were so secretive about their birthdays. You had to guess by figuring when he might have graduated



from Roman.

Dunny didn't like a lot of guys but he liked Tommy. Tommy was smart and had ability. And he goofed on Dunn and that helped, I think.

I don't know where all the years have gone. That is how much fun it is. You've got to be a people person. That is what Tommy is.

The Court Came First

In the beginning, he did a lot of work. He built up the tennis from ground zero and below. It was bad. Everyone just went to the golf course back then. He ran all the lessons and draws and clinics. He did the "M&M's"—that was the junior clinics, where he'd hand out M&M's after the hour. He had his own group of ladies who adored him. He encouraged them. He'd just size you up and knew what your personality was. Everyone was taught differently. Tom did it according to you. He individualized. He worked to enhance what aspects he could. He was an instant friend.

The court came first. He was there till all hours. If you called at 7pm, just when he was going out the door, he's say, "Oh, I'll be here for a while, come on down."

A Natural Teacher

I grew up at Tuxedo from the age of twelve, but I never ventured into the Tennis House. Once Tommy arrived, I met him while I was playing lawn tennis. He said, "I bet you can't wait for court tennis season to start."

"Why do you say that?"

"You have a natural court tennis stroke."

"I do?"

Once I went into the Tennis House, I never played lawn tennis again. After a couple of lessons, he threw me into a doubles match at Philadelphia. We won the match and I was hooked.

He's got the same, wry sense of humor. He played a lot of practical jokes. He'd call Eddie Noll to enter two English players in some draw, some made-up names like "oh, yeah, a guy named Squeezer. Chick Squeezer." Eddie really bit on it.

Tommy related very well to the players. Positive psychology.

Protecting egos. Humor. He was a natural teacher.

A True Friend

Tommy was like an older brother. He'd go on court for a lesson and I'd go into the dedans and watch. "Why are you sitting there?" he'd sometimes ask. I told him that it was educational and entertaining to watch him manipulate someone in the nicest way, to get them to learn.

He didn't have the swiftest organizational capacity. He'd write down notes in these little black notebooks but they weren't dated or organized and so you wouldn't know if he had done it.

He was humble. He never asked for a raise. He didn't think he had tenure. He doesn't feel that way now. Everything was placid. No matter who he had to work for or what he had to do. Everyone gets Tommy—it is an art. Everyone thinks they know him and that he likes them and that they have a good relationship. This is a rare, rare thing with a pro. His biggest attribute was to be a true friend to everyone in a genuine way. A good listener.

He had an incredible work ethic. He'd be there as many hours as was needed. He tried to pick up the phone as much as possible—if someone called, it was as if he was just waiting there for them to call.

He was the consummate pro. He must have played Jim Cathcart a thousand times and everytime it was 6-5, 5-6, 6-5.

Very Wise

I was in New York at the R&T and playing squash when I met Tommy. He needed me for an inter-club match and basically threw me out there. I felt like a hockey goalie, the ball coming at me and I was fending it off. I wasn't quite sure what I was doing, but it was kind of fun. He got the hook in.

We were spending weekends at Tuxedo, and lo and behold there is this court tennis thing there too. It was a bit sleepy at the club in the mid-seventies. The balls were pretty great—the cores were made out of men's suits and draperies—anything Tommy could get his hands on.

He was so flexible. He could handle any member or guest. He was an amazing diplomat. He walked on the stepping stones and never fell into the river. More than a half-century in this game with all these complicated personalities, and he never got involved. He ran tournaments with what he called "pocket draws." Before the handicap system, he would seed according to ability, sprinkle players in, guys calling up to join or quit last minute. It was always changing and so Tommy kept it in his pocket.

He never got too upset about losing. One time he and I were playing together in Newport and he seemed more mellow than usual. We found out the next day that he had suffered a concussion that morning.

He doesn't bore you with stories. He always has an appropriate story at the appropriate time, complementing what is going on and not repeating himself again and again. He has a wonderful memory for this stuff. He can imitate Jimmy Dunn perfectly, "Come over here, kid."

He is very level-headed. He is very wise about emotions, practical things in life, problems. He dealt with Marge's death, this awful tragedy, so well. He is a great single father, always there for his kids.

Obi Wan Kenobi

When guests at Tuxedo find their way to the tennis house they inevitably stumble upon Tom who never fails to welcome them with a warm hand and encouraging word about Tuxedo, and before anyone knows it half an hour has passed with everyone enraptured with some story or historical anecdote. It's how he does it that is so special, so natural, never "have I got one for you!" This pattern is far more salient with members' guests and even more so with those he knows and has known for decades. And every member feels they have a special relationship with Tom, that he is watching the development of their game with special interest, like you're secretly his favorite. It is a unique quality.

We've seen some newcomers begin as brash "lawn" tennis people and under Tom's Obi Wan Kenobi influence transform into what Digby Baltzell would recognize as gentlemen sportsmen. Somehow he spares them the stern, paternal shaming they may have received at a less artful hand. When recently Tuxedo went searching for a new golf pro the sincere hope was to find someone who would have Tom's kind of influence on the people and the culture at the club. Tall order.

Infectious Enthusiasm

While Tommy was great at making tournament draws and was unerring in his seeds, technology was not his strong point. While he did master the mobile phone, computers were not for him. I remember working on a Gold Racquets draw with Tommy one year at my house on a computer—an innovation at the time which Tommy found amazing. When we finished, I told him we would email it as an attachment over to the Tennis House. After a few clicks, I said, "It's gone; it will be there when you get back." A befudddled Greevy leaned over, looked at the back of the computer and said, "Where did it go?"

Managing the Gold Racquets draws plus the Spittoon and Cuspidor doubles on just two courts over four days is never easy. Ably assisted by Jimmy Burke, Tommy would be marking matches at 1.00am and be back on court at 8.00am, always with an attitude that said, "This is really great." Tommy and Jimmy brought an infectious enthusiasm that helped define the Gold Racquets atmosphere.

When it came to marking a high-level court tennis match, Tommy was the world's best, particularly on the Tuxedo court. I refereed many matches that Tommy marked—an easy job because Tommy never missed a mark. He developed a habit of coming over to the dedan once or twice a set to ask me some innocuous question like, "Was that chase one or better than one?" He was just trying to make me feel involved because he knew the chase as soon as the ball left the racquet.

He became the best teacher for players of all levels. Worldclass competitors like Gene Scott and Lauchie Deuchar would come to Tuxedo to fine tune their game with Tommy and to add finesse to their power-forcing styles. Tommy was at his best, however, introducing the game to novices and nurturing the commitment to the game by average club players. Greeves, as he is called by many, always had a unique ability to simplify the mysteries of the court and scoring for the young players so they saw it as fun rather than baffling. Tommy had easy and successful techniques to teach the fundamentals of the game. Through his patience, class and humor, he also taught sportsmanship and love of the game. In playing members, the score was always tied until the last point no matter what level the game. Jim Cathcart has had hundreds of matches with Tommy that always came down to 5 all, 40 all in the third set with Tommy winning most of them with a mainwall-dedan boast that he could always make from any angle.

Tommy was always the consummate pro and a fine teacher. In New York his skills and winning personality were much appreciated by those members already familiar with the game, and he attracted much new blood to it as well.

I think I may have beaten him in the US Open singles one year. Check with Tommy. If it's true, it was just lucky on my part. He was a fine and utterly sportsmanlike competitior.

NEWPORT, RI (1880) NATIONAL TENNIS CLUB

The National Tennis Club continues to prosper and thrive in its little city of just 25,000 souls. Unlike many other courts, we benefit from two rich and busy seasons. In the wintertime the club hosts leagues, tournaments and championships like every other venue; in the summer we welcome not just our summer and non-resident members but also a great many visitors during events including the U.S. Pro Singles, Newport Handicap Doubles, the Velvet Rope, and Pell Cup, whom we host with gracious hospitality. As members of the oldest extant court in the United States and as part of the International Tennis Hall of Fame facility, we are in a position to welcome many thousands per year to our upper gallery and to introduce them to the king of games firsthand.

This past year has been a tremendously busy one at the National Tennis Club. The court now averages more than 70 hours per week throughout the year and can occasionally surpass 90 hours. Between club and interclub tournaments there were more than 30 tournaments and championships hosted at the NTC this past year. We are grateful to our Head Professional, Rich Smith, for his unfailing efforts to keep the club humming and to raise both the level of the members' quality of play and their enjoyment of our venue. This spring, our very able Assistant Professional, Jake Worseldine, took the opportunity to return to finish his college degree. We wished him well at our annual awards dinner and hope that he will stay in touch with both the NTC and the sport of real tennis.

Many of our members travelled around the country and the world to compete in court tennis events in every corner of the globe and including every level. The family of friends made on these trips has returned the favor, attending our Newport tournaments in large numbers. We are grateful for their friendship and thank them for their willingness to travel





great distances to make our tournaments into noteworthy international events.

The summer season is chock full of events, starting with the Newport Handicap Doubles. In 2011, 28 teams in four separate divisions vied for supremacy in what is locally referred to as "Kip's Tournament" (so named for its generous founder, Kip Curren). As usual, there was a wonderful dinner at Harbour Court and the event frequently sells out before the promotional fliers even reach the mailboxes of the court tennis community. The Handicap is followed by the Velvet Rope, founded ten years ago and continuously chaired by Brian Owens and Marc Lewinstein. The Rope is an annual gathering of the young and beautiful and the weekend's many social events even include some time to play Real Tennis. The Pell Cup, played in August, is always a wonderful gathering of talent both national and international. The Pell features five flighted divisions in a non-handicap round robin format that engenders a fierce competition and high level of play.

During the Fall and Winter season there are a number of great events that are held that bring the club back together and inject energy into the community. The Opener (so named because it Opens the NTC season) is a fun tournament where players are paired by the pros for handicap doubles. The weekend of tennis is capped by a fabulous dinner in our upper gallery. Usually held around Halloween, this year's "Retro" theme brought out some extraordinary looks of the 1950s, '60s, '70s, and '80s.

Two continuing events carried through the majority of the winter season: Night League and Lunchtime Eights. Night League is team tennis leading to an end of season play off. The year was neck and neck with different teams taking the lead as large numbers of fellow team members cheered from the Sky Boxes overlooking the court while consuming lavish buffets. In the end Frank Oliveira captained his team The Chourice Force back from last place in the regular season all the way to the Playoff Championship, beating Petra's Pirates, The Tambourines, and the regular season champion team Paisan's Victory in the finals. The Chourice Force lost the first match in each of the three playoff rounds and had to

continually battle back from behind before claiming victory. Brewer Rowe, in particular, helped carry The Force when the chips (and his team) were down. The Lunchtime Eights had four divisions of eight players who play handicap doubles with each of the other seven as a partner over the season. There is then a playoff with 7&8 battling 5&6 to face 3&4 in the semis. The winner of the second round faces the season winners 1&2 in the finals so anything can (and frequently does) happen. In the Premiere 8 Group Jake Worseldine (with a minimum of assistance from Ross Cann) was victorious over Alex Walsh and David Boenning. In the Great 8 Group Frank Oliveira was victorious with John Murphy. The Mid 8 Group final victors were Steve DeVoe and Athol Cochrane. In the After Eight group, William Burgin and Fred Van Liew emerged victorious. It was almost a pity to have the season end as these Eight matches were a highlight of the week for those who participate in them, replete as they are with great tennis battles among players of similar level.

In the April club championships more than a hundred matches were played to determine the eventual winners. The Handicap Singles had 56 entrants vying for that trophy alone! The final in this category was fought between two relative newcomers, Chris Cushing and native South African Athol Cochrane, with Athol claiming victory in a closely fought match. Newcomers are the lifeblood of the National Tennis Club program and we celebrate their success in our most challenging of sports. Speaking of newcomers, and in particular the youngest of them, the Juniors, Newport once again hosted the Lieb Cup. More than a dozen juniors came from far and wide to compete, learn, connect with one another, and, of course, mostly to have tremendous fun!

At a spectacular awards dinner held at the elegant Canfield House the only absences were Ladies' Champion Amanda Avedissian and Men's Champion Pat Winthrop, who were down in Washington winning the U.S. Mixed Doubles Championship. These two, both beneficiaries of the Lieb Fund, are among the strongest amateurs in the country in their respective player categories and are a fine tribute to both John Lieb's generosity and vision, not to mention the attention and coaching quality of our local professionals. As many may know, John Lieb was a player who died way too young, but who left a legacy to insure that junior players would have access to court time and lessons. The Junior program is once again comprised of an enthusiastic group of 10-14 year olds who are learning a real love of, and skill in, the game.

Of all of our many events perhaps the greatest tennis play occurs each year during the U.S. Pro Singles for the Schochet Cup. This year the NTC welcomed many of the top world ranked players as part of the annual tournament and the quality of play was, as always, remarkably high. Camden Riviere, the winner of the two previous years, overcame world #2 Steve Virgona in the semifinal round to reach the finals against Bryn Sayers, playing in his first finals of what has become a major fixture in the IRTPA calendar. With Jay

Schochet himself in attendance, Cam played with amazing power and vigor and simply overpowered a very capable Sayers 6/2,5/6, 6/3, 6/2 in a superb match before a full house of spectators.

During the tournament, we uploaded live video worldwide from our recently completed video system to help share the amazing tennis that unfolded during the week and people around the world were following the action moment by moment. This system was the brainchild of Jay Schochet, who has done so much over the years to elevate the life of the Club and help broaden the appeal of court tennis. Former Club president Bill Burgin was instrumental in helping solve the many technical issues to bring this project to a successful conclusion. In addition to uploading the matches to the web, the system allows the pros to save matches to DVD and to even provide visual documentation with wireless microphone instruction for those taking lessons. Many thanks to all the contributors who made this great technical feat possible!

Here in Newport, at the end of another great year, we feel fortunate to play and to host the fabulous game of Real Tennis. We are fortunate to be part of the historic Newport Casino complex. We hope that every player of this magnificent sport finds the time to come and visit us, as there is a thriving home here for the ancient and honorable game of real tennis in the "City by the Sea."

LAKEWOOD, NJ (1899) GEORGIAN COURT By James Zug


This was a breakthrough season at Lakewood. A couple of years spent nurturing our relationship with Georgian Court University finally paid off, and in the fall of 2011 we made significant progress with several key decision-makers within the school community, including fruitful alignments with the athletic director, the director of intramural sports, the chairperson of physical education department, the soccer coach and the tennis coach. The result was that court tennis became an official part of the GCU's intramural program. We presented tennis at the freshman intramural orientation day, put on an exhibition match for the incoming first-year students, (led by Gabe Kinzler and Racquet Club of Philadelphia stalwarts), and we exhibited at the GCU Club Day. All these marketing efforts yielded fifty students signing up to be a part of the GCU Court Tennis Club.

In late September we began holding weekly clinics as a regular intramural activity. The pro was Neil Smith, who agreed to drive more than four hours round-trip every Tuesday to conduct the hour-long clinics. Over the year, Neil did about twenty of these clinics and about fifteen students dropped in at various times for the clinics, with a core of maybe a half dozen undergraduates that showed up most weeks. It was exciting to finally have GCU students playing and solving for their friends the mystery of what that strange court in the Casino was. We also had a nice article in the spring 2012 issue of *Georgian Court University Magazine*, which reported on our activities - "Court Tennis Clinics Introduce Rare Sport to New Generation" read the headline.

In April, we had our first challenge match pitting GCU against RCOP down at the Racquet Club, where the Lions captured the Jock Whitney Intercollegiate Trophy in fine style.

Two tournaments were held at Lakewood this season. In September, for the third year in a row, seventeen players from Boston and Washington met halfway at Lakewood. The event, now called the Lakewood Invitational, has grown to include players from RCOP and Newport and is now providing a great launch to the tennis season. The popular Jay Gould tournament came off in May, with teams from Philadelphia, Newport, Boston and Tuxedo playing under the watchful eye of Gabe Kinzler.

Full credit to Schuyler Wickes who magnificently led the effort to fully integrate court tennis into the GCU community.















Head Professional Tim Chisholm has been a boon to all five racquet sports at Tuxedo and has done a remarkable job of recruiting new players and keeping them on court regularly. He and Assistant Professional Tony Hollins tirelessly ply the slate with Tuxedoans at all levels. But, having just won the Racquets Singles Championship, Larken turned his sights to tennis and trojaned past Sonne and Meringoff to put himself in position to play for his second cup of the tournament. But he'd have to outduel the top ranked U.S. player Pat Winthrop who had warmed up in victories over Pell, Gould, and previous champion Devereux. Gold Racquets has seen some epic Finals in recent years and this year's proved to be one for the books. After dropping the first set to Winthrop's spry vigor and arsenal of shots Larken's strategies began to prevail. Shot after shot found one corner then the next eventually wearing down even Winthrop's skillful retrieving. He evened it up in the second, pulled ahead with a win in the third, and with the title on the line and

young Jasper cheering on his dad, turned on his best stuff. In the end the enthusiastic crowd saw Larken standing in that rarified place in Gold Racquets history, holding both Tennis and Racquets trophies, undefeated in both sports.

The Cuspidor. Under Chisholm's steady cultivation the Cuspidor Court Tennis doubles event has grown to be quite a popular and competitive draw with 52 players participating in 4 Divisions. Tight entertaining matches over four days culminated with the following results:

Whitehouse Division - Marc Lewinstein (Newport) and Greg Romero (Tuxedo) defeated Arnold Spangler (Tuxedo) and Jeff Cutshall (Tuxedo) 8-5.

Burke Division - Phil Tavani (Tuxedo) and Graham Freydberg (Newport) defeated Paula Tocci (Tuxedo) and Martin Whitmer (Prince's Court) 8-1.

Club Championship Singles. In the first semifinal Sonne prevailed over Laukitis. In the second semifinal Mayor Tom Wilson fell to McHugh in straight sets. The final pitched the solid steady play and fantastic retrieving skills of Sonne against the power of McHugh. In September, Dacre Stoker, tennis chair, took on the role of teaching professional. In addition to teaching lessons, he has created both a winter and a summer league on Monday evenings which attracted 38 players, both events combined spirited play on court and jovial social activities off the court. Dacre and club secretary. Lou Papouchado initiated an online court booking system, which has been very well received by tennis players.

The fall competitive season kicked off with the twelfth annual Calhoun Witham Cup in November. As in previous years, we had a sold-out field of twenty-four teams from Boston, New York, Washington, Newport, Australia, and England, as well as many Aiken players. The tournament consisted of six Divisions of four teams with each participating team being guaranteed three matches. The six divisional winners and top two other teams played in the quarterfinals followed by the top 4 moving on to the semifinals Sunday morning with the finals played at noon on Sunday.

In the quarter finals Aiken's Robert Glance and Philadelphia's John Iole prevailed against Radley's Vern Cassin and Sarah Backhouse 2-6, 6-5, 6-5. Aiken's Tom Swift and Francois Verglas won over Newport's Clem Napolitano and Washington's Martin Whitmer 6-5 6-2. Melbourne's Bob Malseed and Newport's Steve Devoe outlasted Petra Napolitano and Kip Curren from Newport 2-6, 6-2, 6-5. Ginny Goodyear and her son Seth Kopald prevailed in a real nail biter with Aiken's Jason Mengel and Robert Cook 6-5 5-6, 6-5.





This set the stage for the Sunday morning semifinals, but not before the crowd of over one hundred were treated to a gourmet tournament dinner prepared by Chef Brandon from Juniper restaurant.

In the semifinals Goodyear and Kopald beat Glance and Iole 6-4, 6-2, while Malseed and Devoe beat Verglas and Swift 6-2 2-6, 6-1. A brunch was served compliments of the Witham family after the semi finals.

The finals were played to a packed viewing room and side galleries. Ginny Goodyear and her son Seth Kopald prevailed in a very close back and forth match over Bob Malseed from Melbourne and Steve Devoe from Newport 6-5, 6-4.

Informal dinners have continued every Wednesday evening at the Club. These are held mostly outdoors on our patio or indoors if the weather is too cold or rainy (which is not too often). Members rotate responsibilities to cook, or to bring prepared foods, to serve anywhere from eight to over twenty regulars who have come to really enjoy this event. A nice selection of wines is always served and socializing continues well into the night and sometimes spills over to nearby bars.

The Honeck Bisque Doubles, our annual inter-club team doubles event, held in January, is played in memory of Hank Honeck. To honor Hank's love of the "bisque", we utilize a bisque or a half bisque in addition to handicapping the matches. As usual, a wide variety of players participated in this spirited event. The winning team included: Robert Cook, Charlie Bostwick, Duncan Rutherfurd Jr, Ginny Goodyear, and Zach Harrington.

In April, the Knox Doubles attracted a large field of 16 teams. Each team played a round robin schedule of three matches in four pools. The top two teams in each pool advanced to the quarterfinal round, winners then advanced to the semifinals and then to the finals on Sunday afternoon. As usual, the social committee, headed by Michael Sullivan, put on wonderful social and dinner events throughout the weekend. Spectators enjoyed many close matches. The first semi final was an all Aiken event, Clayton Vaughters and Jason Mengel ended Rakesh Jasani and Ben Cook's quest for three consecutive Knox titles with a 6-1, 6-3 victory. The second semifinal was another entertaining three set match. Lex Miron and Jeremy Wintersteen defeated Morgan Purvis and Gary Swantner 6-5, 4-6, 6-3, setting up a rematch from pool play earlier in the week.

In the finals Vaughters and Mengel jumped out to an early 5-0 lead before taking the first set 6-2. Miron and Wintersteen then changed the strategy that they used up to this point in the tournament. At the beginning of the second set, Lex moved back and Jeremy began to defend the galleries. The move paid off and they won the second set 6-4. The third set was a battle with Miron and Wintersteen jumping out to a 4-2 lead. Vaughters and Mengel dug in and came back to win three games in a row to go ahead 5-4. Experience then took over and Lex and Jeremy repeatedly found the dedans and won the next two games in spectacular fashion to claim the title 6-5 in the third set. It was a successful first trip to Aiken for Miron, and Wintersteen adds the 2012 championship to go with his victory in 2009. The galleries were constantly full and the social events were well attended. Camden Riviere and Wayne Davies were generous with their time, offering great coaching and advice in between marking matches and serving as tournament officials.

John Harte, John Haddon and Duncan Rutherfurd have reinvigorated our members by conducting teaching clinics in the little known sport of bottle pool. As a result of the increased interest many new players have become regular players, while the more seasoned players have found good reason to dust off their cues. Club Championships are being played retroactively, Duncan Rutherfurd narrowly edged out Morgan Milner to win the 2010 Championship, 2011 and 2012 Championships will be contested later this year.

Over the past year, the Club has added six new members: Bobby Hottensen, Martin Whitmer, Tom Francoline, Tom Matthews, Morgan Purvis, and Robert Glance. At the same time we have lost a few members, which has kept our total membership at 90.





Tennis in Boston had a solid season in 2011-2012. The amount of play continued to be strong, new players took up the game, and several of them improved quickly. Many T&R players traveled to other clubs for tournaments and posted strong results. Unfortunately, the T&R was not able to fix its roof so play was not possible in inclement weather and the Club could not host any tournaments. While this put a damper on enthusiasm and play, spirits remained as high as they could while roof efforts continue.

Camden Riviere defended his U.S. Pro title in Newport in June by defeating Rob Fahey in the final. A good number of T&R members played in Newport's summer tournament season. In the Newport Handicap Doubles, Kip Curren prevailed in the C Division while Helen Grassi & Ken Forton and Arthur Drane & Allan Booth were finalists in the C and D Divisions, respectively. Brad Ursprung and Evan Turner were finalists in the Velvet Rope and Peter Bender won the Pell Cup C Division. Ken Forton organized the third Annual Lakewood Invitational. PHILADELPHIA (1907) THE RACQUET CLUB



Ginny Goodyear defeated Melissa Purcell in the singles final, but Melissa gained a measure of revenge by winning the doubles with Kathy Carson over Ginny and Alex Escher. Once again this year, the Greevy Cup was played in Philadelphia. Thirteen players in the 20 handicap range competed for the prize that ultimately went to Kris Motz, who triumphed over Tom Wilson in a three set final. Next up were the 40 and 50 age level tournaments. Washington players found Philly very hospitable that weekend. Rich Moroscak beat Bill Barker in the 40's singles final and then partnered with Bill to defeat Peter Hill and Drew McGowan in the doubles. Steve Hufford was the victor in the 50's singles over John Madzin. Norris Jordan and Ted Manges salvaged some hometown pride by beating Hufford and Bruce Manson in the doubles final.



Another highlight of the tennis season in Philadelphia is the Lord Percival Cup held annually over St. Patrick's Day weekend. This year the Washington team captained by Vu Hoang beat Boston to claim its first Lord Percival Cup.

Steve Virgona's quest for a world championship generated a lot of excitement at the RCOP this year. Steve gained his shot at Rob Fahey's title by beating Bryn Sayers in the final Eliminator at Seacourt in March. Those club members who were not fortunate enough to attend the matches in person gathered at the Club to be part of the packed house that watched the video stream of the match and cheered Steve on. Jon Crowell and Christian Bullitt achieved the gold paint by beating PJ Yeatman and Drew McGowan in the Club doubles championship. It was their first title. Youth trumped experience in the singles championship as well. Crowell defeated defending champ McGowan before beating Peter Hill in the final. Other club tournament winners are listed below.

Thanks are due to our outstanding professionals and our hardworking Tennis Committee. We are excited about the number

The Racquet & Tennis Club's outstanding professionals, Mike Gooding, James Stout and Barney Tanfield, paved a smooth road to an outstanding season. The Club hosted the following USCTA events during the 2011 – 2012 season:

In addition to these events the Racquet and Tennis Club hosted the USCTA Annual Dinner and Auction in conjunction with the Whitney Cup.

Silver Racquet

The Silver Racquet is one of the three premier USCTA singles events and attracts most of the top amateurs in the country. Twelve of the country's top amateurs competed for the Sunday morning Semifinals. In the first semifinal, Patrick Winthrop defeated Lex Miron 6-4, 4-6, 6-3 in a two and a half hour, hard fought match. The second semifinal found Alexis Hombrecher overwhelming Shawn Herlihy in straight sets, setting up a third straight final between Winthrop and Hombrecher in as many years. Hombrecher proved too strong for Winthrop and won in straight sets 6-4, 6-3.

New York Open Handicap

The A division of the NY Open Handicap featured 19 players with handicaps better than 20 including professionals such as James Stout (+5.1) Mike Gooding (3.6), Tony Hollins (5.4) and Barney Tanfield (5.6). Squash phenom, Preston Quick, ruled the top half of the draw dispatching James Stout, Danny McBride and Barney Tanfield. Home professional, Mike Gooding earned his way to finals on the bottom half of the draw by besting Rahul Vinnakota, Bill Barker, and Garrett Gates setting up a tremendously athletic final on Sunday afternoon. Gooding's experience prevailed over the youth and speed of Quick 8-5.



The B division boasted 16 players with handicaps between 21 and 40. Bill Connors (Boston) defeated Arthur Whitcomb (NY) in a very close final, 8/6. In the C division Chris Heffernan (Tuxedo) defeated Chris Hughey (Washington) 8/1 to win the 24 player draw.

Whitney Cup

The Whitney Cup once again attracted the top amateurs in the country and featured spectacular play, exceptional performances, and exciting, close matches. Group 1 consisted of Philadelphia, New England and Tuxedo. New England (2010 Finalists), won its group with a 3-2 victory over Philadelphia with 3 matches going to a final set. Group 2 consisted of New York, Greentree / Aiken (2010 Champions), and Washington. New York won the group with a 4-1 victory over Greentree/Aiken and a 3-2 victory over Washington to secure its place in the finals. In the finals, New England won the Seniors match 6/4 in the 3rd set to take the lead, and was up in the 3rd set of the #4 match with several match points. New York clawed its way back to win the #4 match and went on to win the #1 and #2 matches that followed giving the team the much anticipated victory.

U.S. Open

The U.S. Open Singles attracted 18 professionals and 1 amateur including Steve Virgona, Bryn Sayers, Ben Mathews, James Stout and Tim Chisholm. Top seed, Virgona (last year's winner) made quick work of the field by advancing to the finals without losing a set. Bryn Sayers, #2 seed, did not lose a set until meeting Tim Chisholm in the semifinals, but eventually prevailed in 4 sets. The final was some of the year's the best strategic tennis played at the Racquet and Tennis Club. Virgona started the match nothing short of awesome. Amazing

gets, crushing forces and accurate attacks on the grille resulted in a 25 minute 6/0 set to Virgona. Sayers battled back in the second set finding greater comfort in his length and squeaked out a 6/5 win. Virgona continued with his assault in the third set but Sayers defended much better and continually made Virgona hit an extra ball to win points. Despite losing the third set 6/4, Sayers seemed to be holding his ground and frustrating Virgona. In the fourth set, Sayers' strategy began to pay huge dividends as he continued to chip away at Virgona with a 6/3 win. The fifth set was surprisingly one sided in score, but points continued to be long and arduous. Sayers prevailed 6/1 in the fifth to capture his first U.S. Open.

The U.S. Open Doubles draw featured 10 teams. Top seeds Virgona / Chisholm raced to the final dropping only 3 games. Sayers and amateur Kieran Booth had a tough 5 set match in the semifinals against home professionals Mike Gooding and James Stout setting up the #1 and #2 seeds in the finals. After losing the first set 6/2, Virgona demonstrated why he is considered the best doubles player in the world. Virgona / Chisholm went on the win the next three sets 6/3, 6/3, 6/1.

Etchebaster Cup

The Etchebaster Cup had 27 entries, one of the larger draws in recent years. Bill Connors (B division NY Open Handicap winner) made it to the finals without dropping a set. In a hard fought contest, Roberts defeated Connors 6/2, 6/3 in the finals.

U.S. Amateur

The U.S. Amateur drew 10 players for singles and 5 doubles teams. In singles, Pat Winthrop bested Danny McBride on his road to the semi while Ben Cook outlasted Bill Barker to advance in his draw. Both matches were in straight sets. In the semifinals on the top half of the draw, found doubles partners paired against each other. Pat Winthrop defeated Ben Cook in



two sets 6/2, 6/3 in a very hard fought semifinal.

The bottom half of the draw paired Jeremy Wintersteen against Lex Miron. Wintersteen had already survived two matches in the tournament not dropping a single set on his road to the semi. Lex Miron survived multiple match balls down in the second set to Brook Hazelton in their quarterfinal match-up going on to prevail 6/4 in the final set on his road to the semi. Wintersteen proved too strong for Miron winning in two very close sets 6/4, 6/4.

The singles final featured Winthrop and Wintersteen competing for either player's first U.S. Amateur Singles title. Wintersteen was extremely close to winning both the opening and closing sets of this straight set final, but in the end Pat Winthrop prevailed 6/5, 6/2, 6/5 to take home his first U.S. Amateur Singles title.

The doubles final was a meeting of two former winners of the event. Last year's winners, Pat Winthrop and Ben Cook, took on the team of Lex Miron and Peter Pell who won the title as partners in 2004. The match got off to a very lop-sided start with Winthrop/Cook taking the first set 6/0 and looking to be in complete control. Miron/Pell fought back in the second set to take the set 6/5 and even the match. In an amazing display of doubles by both teams, Miron/Pell defended countless set points in the third set to fight back from a 1-5 deficit and take the set 6/5. Miron/Pell closed out the match 6/3 in the fourth set to secure each player's third U.S. Amateur Doubles title. We would like to thank our professionals Mike Gooding (head), James Stout and Barney Tanfield. Our thanks also go to the Games Committee and all the other members who contribute to make our tournaments and programs run successfully.

USCTA Membership Report 2011-2012



Dacre Stoker (Membership Secretary)

Membership totals in the past five years are as follows: 2008-706, 2009-720, 2010-732, 2011-711. We lost a total of 99 members from last year, but we gained 62 new players, and 16 returned to active status after being previous members.

The USCTA and the USCTPF have been investigating a more streamlined approach to utilize the RTO system to assist with signing up and renewing USCTA memberships. At present we are beholden to every club to solicit memberships and to capture annual dues. Each club has a slightly different billing cycle therefore dues are collected and sent to the USCTA treasurer between September and February. Since our tournaments start in early fall we usually do not have a complete USCTA membership roster until half way thru the season. This makes it difficult to verify which players are paid up members of the USCTA when they play in USCTA national events.

It would be very helpful if all clubs agreed to bill for USCTA membership in late summer and get the completed list to the USCTA by November 1st.

In the mean time we have instituted on-line membership purchases, so if a player wants to sign up independently of their clubs billing cycle they can do so. In addition, a club rep or tournament organizer can ask if a player who enters a USCTA tournament is paid up or not, he/she can request that the player sign up on the spot using a credit card for payment if necessary. New and continuing Initiatives for the 2012-13 Season

- 1. Continued growth of USCTA membership
- 2. Continue to attempt to reconcile differences in numbers between any "active" US-based RTO members and those billed by the eight clubs while efforts have been made to reconcile these lists at the individual club levels, it still appears there are RTO users who get the benefit of this system without paying USCTA dues, so this gap should be closed.
- 3. Continued outreach to the USCTA membership demonstrate what they get for their annual dues
- 4. Continue efforts at the club level to introduce new players to the game (using the "Short History of Real Tennis" brochures and other effort such as clinics), and integrate these new players into the USCTA membership
- 5. Continue to impress upon all of the clubs to complete their billing cycles, and to forward to the USCTA the lists of current members by November 1st of each year.
- 6. All tournament organizers need to be more diligent to check to see if all competitors in National events are paid up members of the USCTA.
- 7. Explore the possibility of billing our members directly thru the RTO system. This could have some merit if we have accurate email addresses, and would help close the gap between membership information held by the USCTA and the RTO systems.


